Hope in Times of Trouble

Before Jesus was born, the Jewish people in Jerusalem and nearby regions were tired, discouraged, and had little hope that their lives would improve. They were oppressed by Roman military and political rulers, and their own religious leaders burdened them with laws and expectations they themselves couldn't follow. The people felt beaten down and uncertain whether God had abandoned them. Although the Jewish people had experienced hardships before, life was particularly difficult at the time of Jesus' birth.

Have you ever felt discouraged, tired, weighed down by sin and guilt, or abandoned by God? Most of us have at some point in our lives. Christmas is when our culture—and much of the world—celebrates God coming to our rescue. The birth of Jesus marks a major turning point in all of creation. God was making a way for His people to return to Him.

Have you ever wondered why we sing Christmas carols and hymns? As you read or sing the following familiar Christmas song, reflect on how the news of Jesus' birth would have been celebrated by the angels in heaven, and what these words mean to you.

Joy to the world! the Lord is come; Let earth receive her King; Let every heart prepare him room, And heaven, and heaven, and nature sing. Crossroads goes digital: Just for Students and Threads on the Pando App!

In recent years, the use of tablets and smartphones has become a part of daily life. Currently, there are over a million tablets in jails and prisons. While technology is amazing, fun, and useful for many things, it has also created some unintended consequences. For Crossroads, the fact that tablets are replacing physical mail for people in jails and prisons has presented many challenges. Over the past two years, we've been working on how to make Crossroads accessible to students who can no longer receive our lessons and mentor letters through the mail. Although we're making progress, we're not there yet.

One important change in your experience as a student is that you can now access spiritually nourishing content from Crossroads through the Pando App, if you have a tablet with it installed. Just search for "Crossroads Prison Ministries" to enjoy movies, podcasts, books, and messages from Crossroads and other great ministries. Starting with this issue of *Just for Students*, many more people will be able to access it digitally. This digital version will allow thousands of men and women to learn about Crossroads and get involved in the program.

We will continue mailing *Just for Students* in print, but instead of sending it every three months, we will only mail it twice a year. A digital version will still be available every three months on the Pando App. We understand that some students who don't have a tablet with the Pando App will only receive *Just for Students* twice a year, instead of four times a year. However, as we strive to be good stewards of the donations we receive, sending *Just for Students* by mail every six months will save the ministry thousands of dollars.

If you don't have access to Crossroads on a tablet, we apologize. But if this is your first time reading *Just for Students* on a tablet, welcome to a community of men and women growing together in faith and love for God and others.

Additionally, our *Threads* booklets, where we feature artwork from our students, will now be available only on the Pando App this fall. If you don't have a tablet with the app installed, you won't be able to access them.

The Word Made Flesh

"The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14)

John's Gospel tells us that the Word (Jesus) became flesh and lived among us. This verse is why Christians have celebrated Christmas for centuries: God sent His Son into the world to be born in a humble stable, a moment that holds significance for all creation. Jesus lived on Earth for 33 years, teaching, healing, and revealing the Father to us. As Paul wrote in Colossians, Jesus is "the image of the invisible God." Eventually, Jesus went to the cross to suffer and die for the sins of humanity, and we remember His death and resurrection at Easter.

This winter's prayer and reading guide focuses on John's Gospel. Of the four gospels in the New Testament—Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John—John's is the most distinct. It was written in Koine Greek, the common

language for communication and business in the Mediterranean region. John's audience wasn't primarily Jewish, so he used language and ideas that a non-Jewish, Greek-speaking world could understand. John opens his Gospel with these words: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).

The Greek word translated as "Word" in this passage is "logos." In Greek philosophy, dating back to Heraclitus around 500 years before Jesus, "logos" referred to the divine reason or mind of God that brought order to the universe. John connects with his Greek audience by essentially saying, "Yes, there is a divine mind that created and gives meaning to the universe, as you believe." And that divine mind is Jesus, whom we preach and testify about.

John's Gospel is a literary masterpiece, both simple and profound. It leaves no doubt about who Jesus was and is. While many have argued that Jesus was just a good teacher, a prophet, or simply someone sent by God, John makes it clear: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1).

Trivia: The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. How many of these did you know?

- Jesus was a common name among Jewish people in the 1st century and was pronounced "Yeshua."
- Jesus' last name was not Christ.
- Many scholars believe that Jesus was born in the year 4 B.C. rather than 1 A.D.
- Jesus was likely ordinary-looking, unlike the images that artists have painted of Him.
- Jesus was not a vegetarian; He ate fish and the traditional Passover meat, which was lamb.
- The 30 pieces of silver that Judas received for betraying Jesus would be worth approximately \$340 in today's silver market.
- Jesus' tomb was protected by a large stone, a guard, and a Roman seal, which warned that anyone trespassing would be breaking the law and could face crucifixion themselves.
- After His death and resurrection, the New Testament records at least twelve instances of Jesus appearing to His disciples.

From the Operations Department:

- If you move to a new facility or go home and want to continue your lessons, please let us know. To continue studying from home, wait until you are living there to send us a note with your address.
- Crossroads continues to adapt to changes in how mail is handled in correctional facilities. Starting in
 December, you will notice a shift from the lesson booklets you currently receive to lessons formatted on
 standard 8.5-by-11-inch sheets of paper. Many facilities across the country are now scanning incoming
 mail for distribution. However, some scanning services struggle to accurately process Crossroads'
 current lesson booklets, leading some facilities to stop accepting our lessons altogether. By switching
 to these reformatted lessons, we hope to reach more students who have faced challenges in receiving
 their lessons. While the new format will look a little different, the content remains unchanged. We are
 committed to making the reformatted lessons visually appealing, although they will now feature black
 and white artwork instead of color. This adjustment is necessary because scanning services typically
 cannot handle color artwork.
- On the back of your lessons, we write a six-digit number. This number is specific to that lesson and helps
 us process your submissions. You do not need to pay attention to this number. When you return your
 completed lessons, please do not write the lesson ID number on your return address.
- The next *Just for Students* will be available exclusively on the Pando App in March 2025. The next print version will be delivered in June 2025.
